The ironwork is on display until the end of September and the Arboretum is open every day of the week except Tuesday so put it on your list of things to see while in Flagstaff.





May Demo Report Demonstrator: Roger "Grizz" LaBrash

Our May demonstration featured Grizz forging a bear head. It was inspired by Darryl Nelson and his animal heads.

Grizz began the demonstration by discussing the tools that he needed to make his bear head. He made most of those tools from sucker rod. He began the forging process with a piece of 1 1/4" solid rod. The first step was to fuller down one end to fit in the hardy hole in his anvil. That was so he could apply chisels and other tools directly to the other end of the work piece. Then he showed a set of adaptors welded up from angle iron (see a picture below) that would allow him to put the work piece in a vise instead of the hardy hole in his anvil. That would bring the up to a more comfortable height for many of the steps needed to create the bear head.

After a good lunch provided by our host, Juan Silvestre, and the usual Iron-in-the-Hat drawing, Grizz finished the bear head and proceeded to demonstrate forging an eagle from a piece of angle iron.

Grizz brought a story-board collection of heads in various stages of completeion. He said it took two to three days to make this collection to help his demonstration.



Basic Tool. Jiffy Tongs

Another initial tool that Richard needed was tongs. He showed what he termed *jiffy tongs*, something that could be made quickly and easily, and remade as necessary.

To make jiffy tongs:

Take a roughly 30" length of 3/8" round stock.

Flatten the ends. Make a slight curve in the ends.

Flatten a section 4" to 6" in the center, to make a spring section. The center should be about $\frac{1}{8}$ " thick. Cool the stock and try 'em. If too stiff, thin the spring section some more.

With your hammer, make a step, holding the spring section off the anvil. Inertia of the metal will start the curve for the spring loop. Make the opposite step, and then bring the spring section around.

Adjust the working ends to your project needs.

What is a touchmark and why should I have one? Part 2

This is the follow up article I promised on how to obtain a touchmark of your own.

First let's look at a couple of ways to make a touchmark in true blacksmith style.

I made one by flattening out the tip of a 7" piece of sucker rod into a shape much like a straight chisel, but instead of making it sharp, I kept the end flat. I left it about 1-1/8 x ½ inch. Next I drew the shape I wanted on the flat end using a toothpick and shellac. I covered any steel that I did not want etched. Then I soaked the tip in the salt bath etch presented by Liz Carlier at the January 2013 AABA demo.* The symbol is of a single stick match. The edges are not the best formed, but it is recognizable as a stick match.



7" of $\frac{3}{4}$ " Sucker Rod flattened to 1-1/8 x $\frac{1}{4}$ and pattern etched on the tip.

Another AABA member, Ivan Hill, made his touchmark simply by grinding a flat on the end of a 1/8" pipe tap to reveal the "H".



You can also have a touchmark machined. I got the two below from Superior Steel Stamp Company. (Superior Steel Stamp Co. was one of the donars of door prizes for the AABA auction last November.)





Crossed matches and first initial with last name in 3/16" high letters.

Keep your forge hot and hit hard.



THE WEDGE JOINT

In January Caleb Cullman conducted a "Innovating with Joinery" class (see March 2010 issue THE ANVIL'S HORN – page7) at Sahuaro Ranch Park. One of the joints discussed and constructed was a WEDGE Joint. The following illustrates the components required and the material sizes we used during the exercise. The key to understanding the join – the vertical member's square slit and drifted hold must be big enough to allow the horizontal member and the wedge strap to fit thru it. Try it, it was a very good forging exercise.
