

All the "mice" are made generally the same way with alterations made to adapt for their purpose. Once you have the knack of making a mouse, you can make all the variations!





- 1. Bottle Opener Mouse*
- 2. Necklace Mouse
- 3. Ornament Mouse
- 4. Ball Cap Clip-on Mouse
- 5. Hat Pin Mouse
- 6. Necklace Mouse w/tail
- 7. Key Ring Mouse

*All mice are made using the following steps, for Bottle Opener Mouse, fuller a spot on the rear end of the mouse to lift off cap of bottle.

Material: 3/16" X 3/4"

Follow these easy steps, feel free to design your own mouse!







Left—Necklace mouse, extra long tail to put on chain, can also be an ornament mouse. Center—Bottle Opener Mouse, note the "bump" on the rear end of the mouse for bottle opener. Right—Hat Pin Mouse, the tail actually goes through the pre-stitched holes in caps. Below/Right—Clip on the brim type mouse, also in group photo #4

- 1. Taper
- 2. Fuller
- 3. Bend head down over horn to soften edges
- 4. Draw out tail
- 5. Fuller ear, eye punch with nail set, nail set half for nose
- 6. Position tail for the mouse you are making!

Ypres 2016 International Blacksmith Event

The Belgian Guild of Blacksmiths, ASG, and the British Artists Blacksmiths Association, BABA, are remembering the 100-year anniversary of World War I (The Great War) with a Poppy Cenotaph designed by Terrence Clark. It measures 7 meters high x 2 meters wide x 10 cm thick with a poppy cut into one edge using both positive and negative forms to represent both sides of the war. "The negative, commemorates those that lost their lives, the families they left behind and those who were emotionally and physically damaged; the positive is the future that springs from their sacrifice, those that survived and their descendants."1 The base will be surrounded by 2016 poppies and 25 panels all made by smiths around the world. The significance of the British and Belgian relationship in the war stems from their relationship throughout history.

Blacksmiths are involved because of the importance they played in the war to maintain equipment and shoe horses. "They, along with soldiers, generals, miners and medics paid a terrible price." As a symbol of peace for generations to come, the internationally recognized icon will be a remembrance of all who suffered and guidance to make peace will be built in the form of a Flander's Field Poppy in Ypres, Belgium. (Ypres is pronounced E·pris.) Many battles were fought in this area and nearby Langemark Poelkapelle where gas was first used as a weapon.

There are many ways to participate. One of the easiest to forge out the poppy petals from a precut blank. There are instructions on the Ypres website using power and hand hammer techniques. While no

two poppies will be exactly alike, using the same process and technique make them look the same as much as possible. In death, we are all equal and the organizers would like the poppies to all look the same as much as possible. Normally, you would mark your work, but on this project please do not place any identifying marks (touch marks) as requested by the organizers. Thank you in advance for your understanding.

Steve Miller will collect the poppies at the Jan and March demos for shipping to BABA where they will be hot dip galvanized, fettled, painted, highlighted, and installed.

Originally, we were only asked to make the petals for more cost efficient shipping to BABA in the UK. The stems would be made by BABA. ABANA is now asking for a few stems to be used in a fund raising project to send Master Smith Jeffrey Funk and possibly others to the event in Sept 2016. There are instructions for the stems also, but they require some tooling to be made for which I have instructions. Contact me if you're interested.

Some remaining blanks are available and more can be ordered as needed. Reserve yours by emailing stevemiller.az@cox.net. The cost is \$4 each. which covers the blank plus shipping to AZ at cost. AABA will pay the shipping to BABA.

Blanks and forging help will be available at the December (Cave Creek) & January (Tucson) open forges. Please watch the poppy making videos. Here are several links for more reading and details on making the poppies.

Rocky Mountain Conference Report – How I Spent My Summer Vacation

I attended the 25th Annual Rocky Mountain Conference this summer. It was a great time and I learned a lot.

It started with a camping trip to our favorite family camping area as kids in the White River Natl Forest Flat Tops region. It looked much the same as I remember, but is considerably grown in. The stands of gray beetle killed trees from the WWII era are now part of the soil and many trees have taken their place. Even the river openings are now choked with willows. Still it is a beautiful place and I'm planning a backpacking trip back there next year.

The Conference was held in Carbondale, CO at the Francis Whittaker Blacksmith School. I opted to campout along the Crystal River, which was awesome. The KOA campground had hot showers and a beautiful view by the river. There were accommodations in town too and bunk houses at the school, but this was more to my liking. I met some new folks, bought some interesting items for projects and had a great time.

Some of the things I learned were:

- There are 2 guarantees in blacksmithing
 - 1. Iron rusts (No, I didn't learn this from camping by the river)
 - 2. You're going to get burned (I didn't get burned this time)
- "If you're dumb, you got to be tough" [demonstrator Steve Williamson], (sometimes I'm neither)
- How to make box-joint pliers and much more.

The forging competition was open to all and about 20 participated. With only 4 coal forges available, a 2 hour event lasted most of the night, but was a lot of fun. The competition was to make a duplicate hook from the sample provided in the time allowed. I saw some great smithing work. Many did not finish because they spent a lot of time on just one feature. I was worried I would not finish and got so focused that I didn't notice the flames from the burning anvil stump caused by the hot cutoff I had just made. Someone took care of it for me. Thanks to whoever that was. I was able to finish with some time to spare. I did make it to the final selection, but didn't win. Should have used some of that spare time. Perhaps I'll do better next time. However, it was very satisfying, and I slept great that night after the blood returned to my hammer hand!

Another fun event was the group project. About 20 of us were placed into 4 teams. Each team was assigned a portion of a large candle holder with snuffer. I helped work on the foundation consisting of 3 scrolled legs connected to a round plate with mortise to accept the main post. It sold in the auction for a tidy sum.
